

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I'm a Lutheran

I grew up at the UCC church in Medina. It was a German congregation.

I got married young, at 18. My husband, Art, was teased for marrying someone my age and he said, "I'm marrying a young one, so I can train her."

I'm a Lutheran because I married a Lutheran. My mother just about had a fit. She grew up Baptist. Well, I met Art at a dance, and later he asked me to a movie. He said that from the first time he saw me he knew, "That's the girl I'm going to marry." I sure didn't think that. It was a good marriage.

We spent a year in Jamestown after we got married. In 1953, we attended St. John's where I went through W.W.A. Keller's adult confirmation class. After that we moved to the farm and I did the milking and field work. I spent 5 years working at the school as a teacher's aid.

We started attending English Lutheran and I can tell you that I never thought that I'd be an organist there. I was teaching piano and at one time had 24 students. I don't have any idea how I did it. When we arrived the music teacher at the school was the organist, and he asked me 3 times to come and be the accompanist for the choir before I said yes. He said he would help me out if needed. That was in 1957. Well, he left Medina in 1958 and that's when I started to play. I took 4 months off to have a baby and we had an organ student for a year, but other than that I kept at it (until I fell last year). I struggle with walking now, but I'm not a complainer. I accept the way it is and go from there.

God has always been important to me. My faith grew when Art got bone cancer at age 41 and we dealt with his changing health. We were both able to live with the idea that whatever happens...happens.

My number one priority continues to be my family. I believe that Jesus Christ came to save me even though I am a sinner. He always forgives us if we ask for it.

I pray every day. I have a long list. It's in a notebook. In the morning I give thanks for protection through the night. I pray for my congregation, family, the pastors, for people I know and people I don't - like refugees and people in Ukraine.

I wonder if our churches will ever be the samesince COVID so many people have left.

My favorite bible stories are the birth of Jesus and the crucifixion. If it weren't for that, we wouldn't have any hope.

If I could change anything, I would be more active again with the church ladies. I'd love to play the organ again. For me music is relaxing. I love to just sit and play/hear the music. I love music and have for my whole life. When I was 8 or 9 I remember playing the piano. I like it all, except for hard rock.

I'm not a traveler, after 2 days on the road, I'm ready to return home. I've visited California and Washington, and Texas when Art was in the service. I've been as far east as Minneapolis.

What Do You Notice?



"Why do you want to hear it again?
Do you also want to become Jesus' disciples?" John 9:27

When you read the Bible, what do you notice?

When you hear part of the Bible read to you, what do you notice?

When you see an image of a story from the Bible, what do you notice?

Jesus often used stories to teach and to help people remember what they heard. Some of these stories are called parables. Parables can be long or short. They often have a way of getting into your head with something unexpected. You notice the unexpected and it stays in your memory. The respected people who walk by the injured traveler in contrast to the outsider who stops to help. [Luke 10:25-37] Or the person who scatters seeds in places where they are unlikely to thrive (a path, rocky ground, among thorns, and then in good soil.) [Matthew 13:1-9]

John's Gospel also used stories to teach and to help people remember what they heard. These stories tell details about people who encounter Jesus and whose lives are changed by their experiences. A woman who meets Jesus at a well and tells her whole community that Jesus is the Messiah. [John 4:5-42] Or a man born blind whose sight is restored by Jesus and then tells his story again and again to people who don't seem to believe him. [John 9:1-41]

During Lent, on Sundays listen to the gospel stories from John. Hear the different people who encounter Jesus. What do you notice about the people? How are they like you? How are they different from you? How does Jesus change their lives? How does Jesus change your life?

On Wednesdays at English Lutheran, confirmation students will present different stories from the Bible. They have made posters to tell their stories and will give two minute descriptions of each story. What do you notice when you hear these stories retold? How do the images on their posters help you see these stories in new ways? What details catch your attention?

On Wednesdays at Trinity and St. John's, artwork from Lutheran Pastor Paul Oman will provide a focal image of different parables. Coloring sheets and art supplies will be provided for you to draw these parables for yourselves. What do you notice in the artwork that highlights a part of the parable you had not paid attention to in the past?

During this season of Lent, let the stories of the Bible make a home in your mind's eye. Let them linger. Invite the people of these stories to have a cup of coffee with you as you ask them to share their experiences with Jesus. Pay attention to what you notice. Let these weeks of Lent be a time to connect more closely with God.

Centennial Celebrations

2023 will mark 100 years since the first Lutherans arrived from the United States to what is now Cameroon. 100 years later there are two Lutheran churches that we, the ELCA, relate to here: the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Cameroon (ELCC) and the Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Central African Republic (ELCCAR). Representatives of these churches are expected to be present at the Eastern North Dakota Synod Assembly June 3-4 and to participate in a Synodwide worship service held here in Jamestown at St. John's on Sunday June 11th. Many additional activities are being planned to commemorate the past 100 years and to look forward to the future. God is good!



Ordination of Rev. Sally Azar

On January 22, Bishop Tessa joined hundreds of clergy from around the world to participate in the ordination of Rev. Sally Azar, the first Palestinian woman to be ordained in the Holy Land. Rev. Azar will be serving the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL) English-speaking congregation in Jerusalem.

Christians in Action – Youth and Family Ministries

Among the 8 congregations of the Christians in Action Partnership, there are approximately 220-240 youth in middle and high school.

Upcoming events for youth include a Bowling Event on March 5th in Jamestown. So far, approximately 40 youth from 6 congregations plan to participate.

Looking farther ahead, a summer mission trip for up to 25 high school youth and 5 adult chaperones is being planned as part of the 100th celebration of Lutheran ministry in the Central African Republic and Cameroon. Two days of service work in Minneapolis and a celebration with international guests and participants from around the country are planned for early July.

June 19th - 23rd Counselors from Red Willow Bible Camp will lead Vacation Bible School at Atonement Lutheran in Jamestown - All K thru 5 students are welcome!

Even farther ahead, middle school youth will participate in the Synod CastAway retreat in September 2023.

High school youth will travel to New Orleans in July 2024 for the ELCA Youth Gathering.

All these events take coordination.

In November 2022, a position description was posted for a Director of Children, Youth, and Family Ministries. Applications were due in February.

The anticipated timeline for the search process to unfold looks like this:

February 2023 – The search team will review applications.

March 2023 – Initial interviews will be conducted via Zoom.

Late March or April 2023 – In person interviews with finalists will be held.

Spring 2023 – Once an offer is made to a candidate and they accept, then a start date can be determined.

Summer 2023 – The Director of Children, Youth, and Family Ministries will begin serving in our communities to coordinate large group events such as those named above as well as coordinating local events for youth from our congregations.


Story of Impact

Every week at Trinity Lutheran you will find small, colorful, buckets set out along the railing and floor of the Tech Deck. As worshipers enter the sanctuary they reach into pockets and change purses and drop coins into the buckets on their way to their seats. Later in the service the children will be invited to "bring the noisy offering forward". That's when the excitement begins!

Kids from 2-10 head to the back of the sanctuary. There's usually an usher trying to monitor how many kids are coming back. There's a shifting of coins from bucket to bucket. Sometimes there's only a few kids in worship and everything gets consolidated. Sometimes there's a lot of kids and coins need to be distributed into more buckets so everyone has a bucket to carry. Sometimes when there's not enough buckets there's a mad dash to get a couple of clean coffee cups. Eventually though the parade of kids and coins begins.

At the front of the sanctuary the BIG bucket waits! Some kids quickly dump their coins. Some take the coins out of their bucket and transfer a bit at a time. When all the buckets are collected the pastor carries it to the altar with the offering plates. Sometimes a late comer doesn't get a bucket and gets invited to carry the big bucket up to the altar.

The noisy offering supports the ministries of the Eastern North Dakota Synod. These ministries include Red Willow Bible Camp, Park River Bible Camp, Christus Rex campus ministry at UND, Crossroads campus ministry at NDSU, Dacotah O'Yate Lutheran Church on the Spirit Lake Reservation, The Way (Native American Christian Ministry), South Sudan Lutheran Church in Fargo, and our partnership with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. In 2022 all those coins added up to \$1,389.68. All from pocket change and little hands eager to bring it forward. These colorful buckets and small gifts teach generosity to our children.
