### Your First Bible



Philip ran up to the chariot and heard the Ethiopian court official reading the prophet Isaiah. Philip asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" The court official replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in the chariot and sit beside him.

Acts 8:30-31

All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work. 2 Timothy 3:16-17

What do you remember about receiving your first Bible?

Who helped you understand that the Bible is special?

I recently asked these questions and was inspired by the stories I heard. Some people remembered receiving Bibles as third or fifth graders. Others told of confirmation Bibles or being shown a special family Bible.

Several people told about the wonder and joy of being encouraged to underline or highlight special passages in their own Bible or to take notes about questions they had.

Names of Sunday School teachers, parents, grandparents and others came to mind as we shared stories of the people who have come alongside us like Philip and the Ethiopian court official to help us understand what we are reading. God's Word revealed to us in the Bible teaches us, corrects us, and equips us to lead lives of faith.

When you read the Bible, do you return again and again to familiar passages that bring you comfort or inspiration?

Do you wrestle with passages that challenge you?

Do you have a devotion booklet such as *Christ in Our Home or The Word in Season* or another resource that guides you to explore a new passage of the Bible each day?

Does a Bible verse come to your phone or computer each day?

Do you have a Bible Buddy or study group that you connect with regularly to explore the depth and breadth of God's love for you shared in the Bible?

Any of these ideas can be a way to connect more deeply with God and with other people of faith.

As you continue your journey of faith in Jesus Christ, may the wonder and joy, the questions and the companionship of the Bible guide you each day.

### Christians in Action

The Christians in Action Partnership has been working together in new ways for more than a year. One of the Goals for Christians in Action was to Expand Area Outreach. Some of the comments heard from different congregations reflect the different experiences in each of our communities.

"Many people in small communities know people from other communities. It has been interesting to see how we know the names of lots of people. Perhaps we have met them or worked with them before. This can strengthen those relationships and help people be comfortable working together."

"In our congregation, there is no pastor living in town. The mental image is that we are a congregation without a pastor. We need to educate people that our congregation has several pastors who care about our community. They just don't happen to live in town."

"The congregation is adjusting to hearing multiple preachers each month and appreciates the teamwork. However, members are concerned about losing our identity."

"Questions are asked about who is serving each congregation and what the difference is between what lay leaders and pastors can do."

"It can be enjoyable to have other preachers and musicians at worship services. It shakes things up a little in a good way."

"We promote special events among the partner congregations. This links us together."

Not everything has easy answers, but this partnership encourages us to keep trying. Together we can share God's good news with our communities. We have support and encouragement. We trust that the Holy Spirit will guide us in all we do in Jesus' name.

Congratulations on being assigned a seminary intern to work with next year! As a retired pastor who has supervised 17 interns, your pastor asked me to write a little about my experience in the hope that it will be helpful to you.


You probably know that your intern has already had a lot of education. He or she is already a college graduate, and has had two or more years of graduate courses at the seminary. An intern, though, does not necessarily have a lot of experience in parish ministry. The goal of the internship year is to gain that experience, learning from the supervising pastor and you—the members of the internship parish.

A parish pastor is called on to serve in many roles. Certainly they are to be a preacher and to plan and lead worship. They also do a lot of writing, teaching of youth and adults, they are to do parish administrative functions, be a counselor, a mentor to youth, an evangelist, a leader in the community, and provide comfort and hope to those in grief. The list could go on!

No one is equally gifted in all of these! Internship, though, allows the future pastor to explore a variety of pastoral roles. They can grow in their ministry gifts by polishing the skills they already know that they have and, in a safe setting and with the guidance of the supervising pastor, try some new areas. That makes internship a very important year! You will be amazed at **their** growth during the year, as well as by what **you** learn from the student.

The greatest gift that you can give to the intern is that of Christian hospitality. Welcome him or her (and spouse and family, if any) into your parish, your town, and your life! Provide a safe space where they can try new things, affirm their gifts, and above all, support them with your prayers!

### "I'm a Lutheran"

Congregations that I have been a part of: My family and I have been attending English Lutheran Church for the past eight years, ever since we moved to Medina. Prior to Medina, My family would have been members of the Munich Lutheran Church in Munich, ND. My home church and congregation would be Ascension Lutheran Church in Emerado, ND, where I was confirmed in May 1981.

Occupation: Presently, I drive a school bus route for the Medina Public School District and substitute teach.

I found my faith: In all honesty, I found my faith in my Savior when I went through my personal "16-months of hell."

My first son with Jenn, Ian Carter, was diagnosed with CDH – Congenital Diaphragmic Hernia – in November. Ian would have to go full term in order to determine if anything could be medically done for him. In December, my youngest daughter of my first marriage was diagnosed with Ewings Sarcoma, a form of cancer. In April Ian was born and succumbed to his birth defect. In July my mother, Loretta, succumbed to her cancer. And, in the following May, my daughter succumbed to her cancer, being days before her sixteenth birthday.

An issue I'm fighting for is: I am presently attempting to do some work for under privileged children. I am a present member of the Jamestown Masons and working towards membership with the Jamestown Shriners. In addition to this, I have assisted with some other charitable activities – Schafer COED Softball Tourney (funds for children to participate in extracurricular activities) and McQuad Softball Tourney (funds to assist cancer research and expenses).

My favorite Bible story is: My favorite Bible story is about Zacchaeus, being the public figure whom Jesus asks to go with him.

I believe that: I believe that Jesus Christ died to save me and anyone else who believes in him.

I pray: I pray for people to have both a satisfactory and happy life with internal peace.

I struggle with: I struggle with people being dishonest and/or lying. It is one of my pet peeves.

People are surprised that I: My parents were surprised that I followed through with my goal to become a teacher, as they were even more surprised when I became a secondary principal. Most people who don't really know me are surprised that I do enjoy listening to classical music and instrumental music. I do not play an instrument myself. Classical/instrumental music helps to sooth the inner beast and provide a sense of calmness.

If I could change anything: it would be for the world to rely less on electronic devices for social media.

I'm a Lutheran because: I am a Lutheran because that is the way that I was raised. Both my maternal grandparents and parents attended church regularly. I have attended either Lutheran or Evangelical churches in my lifetime with my families.

For me, music is: Music is a form of relaxation for me. I have been known to listen to various genres of music, depending on either my mood or situation.

Traveling and/or living abroad has taught me: I lived abroad for approximately the first year of my life, as I was born on a US Army Base in Okinawa, Japan, before the US Air Force was determined to be a separate military branch. Since then, I have never lived outside of the United States. Furthermore, I have never lived outside the region of North Dakota, Minnesota, and Wisconsin.

Serving on the council opened my eyes to: Being a member of the English Lutheran Church Council, I have grown to see more of the operations of the church. As with most things, people do not necessarily realize the events and/or actions that occur on Monday to Saturday. People have a general idea of the activities on Sundays. Serving on the Council has allowed me to step back and view the whole operation of the church.

Celebrating the Dead

Many cultures both celebrate and honor those who have preceded us in death. In the US, many Christians recognize All Saints Day on November 1, while in Mexico, they have Días de los Muertos (Days of the Dead) on November 1 and 2. All Saints Day tends to be a more somber affair, but the Day of the Dead honors loved ones through large family gatherings with plenty of food and beautiful altars called Ofrendas!



Everything on the Ofrenda is symbolic-

Photos: Help remember loved ones in the prime of their life

Sugar Skulls: Decorated and inscribed with names of loved ones

Marigolds: Their scent attracts the spirit of the dead and decorate the altar

Fire: Represents departed spirits

Wind: Colorful, cut paper banners announce the arrival of beloved spirits

Pan de Muertos: A sweet bread that represents sorrow

On Thursday, November 2, St. John's will be hosting a Day of the Dead celebration and All Saints Sunday preparation event! We will gather at 3:30PM to create papel picado (cut paper banners), make paper flowers, decorate votive candle holders, and bake some pan dulce, for our Ofrenda. Then from 5:30-7:30PM, we will have a taco dinner and watch a movie about the Day of the Dead. There will be many youth at this event, but it is for all ages!
