# Promises



*“You have made public profession of your faith. Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in holy baptism: to live among God’s faithful people, to hear the word of God and share in the Lord’s supper, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth?” ELW page 234 - Affirmation of Baptism Service*

Over the course of each school year I meet with the 9th Grade Confirmation students and we think about the promises they will make as 10th Graders during the Affirmation of Baptism (Confirmation) service . We review the promises, one each month. Then in the fall of their 10th Grade year they turn in an essay with their thoughts about these promises. All of this conversation and writing is meant to help them consider the importance of these promises, think deeply about their faith, and prepare them to claim their faith.

In my first meeting with the 9th Grade class this fall we were reviewing the promises their parents, sponsors (Godparents), and the whole congregation made when they were baptized. We talked about how the adults in our life promise to raise us in the faith and promise to support us so that we may grow into our faith. We talked about the important adults in their lives who have been willing to share their faith with them. A metaphor I use to help them understand the passing of faith goes like this; the adults in your life built you a house of faith and now you get to decide for yourself if you want to live in that house.

As we prepare to celebrate with those who are affirming their faith in October it is an excellent time to remember. Remember the covenant God made with you in holy baptism. Remember that you are God’s beloved child, adopted into God’s family, a brother or sister of the beloved Son, Jesus. Remember that you belong to Christ, in whom you have been baptized. Remember that you have been sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever. Remember that through baptism you are forgiven, redeemed from death and the devil, and given eternal salvation (Luther’s Small Catechism).

Then remember the promises you made when you affirmed your baptism. You promised to live among God’s faithful people - to surround yourself with people of faith who will help you to live out your faith in God. You promised to hear the word of God - to seek God’s voice and to find faithful preachers and teachers to speak God’s word to you. You promised to share in the Lord’s supper - to gather around the Communion table and receive the body and blood of Christ, to receive God’s grace, and to gather with other Christians in community. You promised to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed - to show your faith to the world through the things you say and do, to let your life proclaim God’s love. You promised to serve all people, following the example of Jesus - to care for neighbors and strangers, enemies and friends. You promised to strive for justice and peace in all the earth - to work towards the world we pray for, a world where God’s will is done. As I remind the 9th grade class, you will never keep these promises perfectly, but they are promises we make with ourselves, one another, and God. Daily we strive to do our best and we ask God for forgiveness when we fall short.

Faith is a group project! Each generation works together to pass on their faith to the next. Each child brought to the waters of baptism is given the promise of a community of faith that will pray for them, support them, and share stories of God’s faithfulness with them. Let us rejoice with this year’s Confirmands and re-commit ourselves to the work of the Gospel - sharing the story of God’s love.

**NDChristiansAct.org** has been established as the Christians in Action website.

This website includes:

**A home page** with links to the individual website of each congregation (and links to the Facebook pages of two congregations that are still developing web pages.)

**A resource page** that lists items that can be accessed by the person from each congregation who prepares bulletins and newsletters. This is called the Treasure Chest.

**A donate page** that helps facilitate electronic giving to each congregation.

Some congregations, such as Trinity and St. John's, have had electronic giving options for many years. Other congregations, such as English, have found this to be a cost effective way to begin receiving electronic donations.

# Synod News – Jamestown Conference

## EAND Synod Fall Theological Conference

It is a well established tradition that each September the synod's Fall Theological Conference is held at Fair Hills Retreat off Pelican Lake in MN. This year was no exception, and September 10-13 leaders from throughout the synod gathered together. There was plenty of time for fellowship, food, and relaxation, but we were also gathered to worship and learn. The Wahpeton Conference planned a beautiful opening worship service, where Bishop Tessa Moon Leiseth preached on the story of Cornelius and Peter in Acts.



Our presenter for the conference was Raymond Pickett who serves as the Rector at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary in Berkeley, CA. His presentation leaned heavily on a book on Acts by theologian Willie Jennings. Using Acts as a guide, he spoke about the importance of sharing the stories of our life journeys. We had time in small groups to explore how we're being shaped by our current journey, how ministry has transformed our lives, how we might bear witness to God's presence by giving voice to our experiences, and other questions. This time spent reflecting was meaningful and helped expand our understanding of both the book of Acts and how God may be working in our lives.

Over the next few months there will be opportunities for congregations to participate in studies on the book of Acts. If you have not read it, or it has been awhile, you are encouraged to give it another go. In many ways where we are at as a society and the church parallels what was happening with the early church during the Roman Empire. Learning from the book of Acts may very well help us better understand life now and how we might best move forward.





# “I’m a Lutheran”

## **Congregations that I have been a part of:**

Trinity Lutheran has always been my church. As a child, I attended Sunday School at Trinity, took sermon notes in the balcony with my long-time friend, and was confirmed at Trinity. ## **I found my faith:**

I don't really feel I "found" my faith. I feel I learned my faith. Though the faith I know now is certainly different than the faith I had as a Sunday School or confirmation student. I think our faith grows in different ways as we go through various stages of our lives. One thing that does not change is what we learned as 3-year-olds – Jesus loves us.

## **An issue I am fighting for is:**

As a true conflict avoider, I don't think I would say I am "fighting" for anything. And I am lucky that I live in a place where I am not forced to fight for what I believe in. I will always work to support what and who I believe in and am not afraid to communicate my opinion.

## **My favorite Bible story is:**

Picking one as a favorite is hard! I know it would be one from the New Testament. Since I have been participating in the Christians in Action lay ministry, I have learned so much about Jesus. The stories I find most meaningful are those where he is telling us or showing us how to treat one another and how to share our faith. He set a great example as to how we should live our lives as Christians, knowing that we would fail and knowing that what he would sacrifice for us.

## **I believe that:**

I believe that we are loved. I believe that having faith in God does not mean that we will not have difficulties in our lives but through prayer, God will provide us what we need to get through our difficulties. I believe that God is in our lives everyday – and most of the time we fail to recognize it! I believe that Jesus has gone to prepare a place for us in heaven, and through his sacrifice our sins are forgiven.

## **I Pray:**

I pray daily – and then some. I am a worrier so my prayer list is often long! I believe God hears our prayers and will answer them according to His plan for us. We are so lucky to live in a world where devotions and daily prayers are at our fingertips! Recently, I have become aware that I often forget that our prayers are to include praise as well, I am working on it!

## **I struggle with:**

3 things:

Control - If you ask anyone that knows me, you will hear that I am an avid planner. I love spreadsheets, calendars and lists! Yet, as I have gotten older, it has become very clear to me that we are not in control, God is. So, I need to let go of thinking I can plan everything that happens in my life and lean on my faith for what is ahead. After all, we are all works in progress – right?!?

- Patience – we live in a world where we expect immediate satisfaction, and sometimes it is hard to be patient. I struggle daily with my lack of patience. Jesus demonstrated we are to be patient with each other. We also need to be patient in expecting answers to our prayers (remember we are not in control).
- And honestly, I struggle with understanding Old Testament scripture – thank goodness for study Bibles!



## Story of Impact

Each year, as parents take eager students to purchase school supplies for the coming year, a list appears. It's the list of supplies for Lutheran World Relief School Kits. Each kit has four notebooks, a pair of scissors, a pencil sharpener, a ruler, an eraser, pencils, pens, and a box of crayons, packaged together in a school bag. It's not a long list. It's not a lot to gather. When the prices are low it's easy to buy a few more items for the sake of children in need. All together each kit costs under \$10, but what a difference it makes!

The Lutheran World Relief Website states, "Education is one of the strongest tools a community has for breaking the cycle of poverty. Ensuring that girls attend school, especially in places where their access is deprioritized, has even stronger results. Lutheran World Relief School Kits contain essential supplies to help children — and in some cases, adults — continue learning in the face of serious obstacles. That learning leads to a better life for them, their families and their communities."

In August and September about 50 LWR School Kits were assembled at Trinity Lutheran. The effort was organized (as it has been for several years) by Ruth Urdahl. This vital ministry makes a real difference in the lives of students all over the world. This is an ongoing event, so watch for an opportunity to contribute again next year!
